In this class, we will conduct an advanced study of environmental trends, governance, social movements, and the prospects for change. Our goal is to explore how issues of the environment are related to historical and contemporary political and economic relations such as capitalism, class relations, the state and scientific knowledge. We will draw on examples of environmental challenges from local to global scales in order to understand environmental politics as simultaneously social and ecological.
